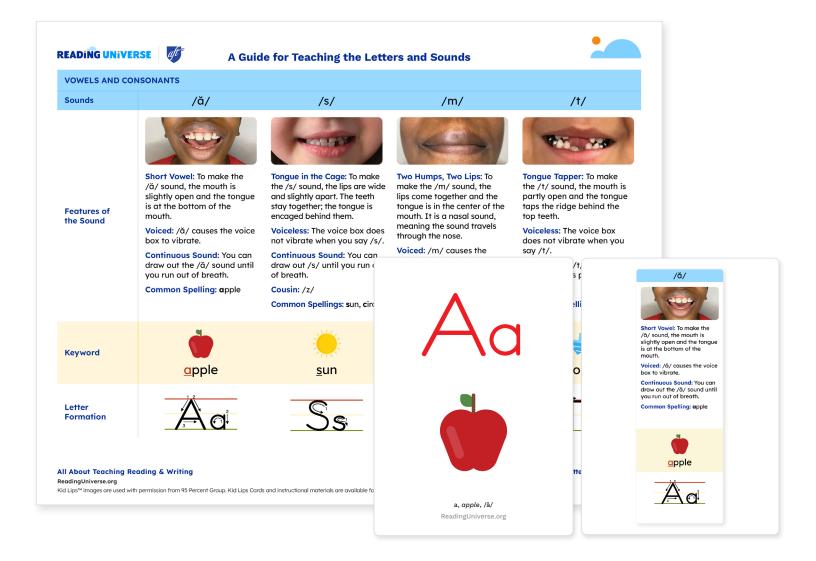


Phonics instruction begins with students learning the 26 letters found in the Roman alphabet, which is made up of vowels and consonants. When teaching the alphabetic principle, students should learn the name, sound, a keyword for memory aid, and letter formation. This guide includes support for teaching these components and is sequenced in an order comparable to many scope and sequences found in reading programs.

#### **Teacher Tip:**

You can cut out each column and attach it to the back of your letter flash cards to help you remember the characteristics of that sound. For each sound, you'll see sound features, mouth shape, keywords, and letter formation.







#### **VOWELS AND CONSONANTS**

Short Vowel: To make the /ă/ sound, the mouth is slightly open and the tongue is at the bottom of the mouth.

Voiced: /ă/ causes the voice box to vibrate.

**Continuous Sound: You can** draw out the /a/ sound until you run out of breath.

Common Spelling: apple



Tongue in the Cage: To make the /s/ sound, the lips are wide and slightly apart. The teeth stay together; the tongue is encaged behind them.

Voiceless: The voice box does not vibrate when you say /s/.

**Continuous Sound: You can** draw out /s/ until you run out of breath.

Cousin: /z/

Common Spellings: sun, circus



Two Humps, Two Lips: To make the /m/ sound, the lips come together and the tongue is in the center of the mouth. It is a nasal sound, meaning the sound travels through the nose.

Voiced: /m/ causes the voice box to vibrate.

**Continuous Sound:** You can draw out /m/ until you run out of breath.

Common Spelling: moon



Tongue Tapper: To make the /t/ sound, the mouth is partly open and the tongue taps the ridge behind the top teeth.

Voiceless: The voice box does not vibrate when you say /t/.

Stop Sound: /t/ has a quick stop after it is produced.

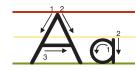


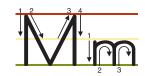

#### **VOWELS AND CONSONANTS**

/ĭ/ /k/ Sounds /p/ /n/



Short Vowel: To make the /ĭ/ sound, the mouth is spread wide and the teeth are slightly apart. The tongue is lifted slightly.

Voiced: /ĭ/ causes the voice box to vibrate.

**Continuous Sound: You can** draw out the /ĭ/ sound until you run out of breath.

**Common Spelling: igloo** 



**Lip Popper:** To make the /p/ sound, the lips come together and then pop open with a burst of air.

Voiceless: The voice box does not vibrate when you say /p/.

**Stop Sound:** /p/ has a quick stop after it is produced.

Cousin: /b/

**Common Spelling: pig** 



**Tongue Toucher:** To make the /n/ sound, the tongue touches the ridge behind the top teeth. It is a nasal sound, meaning the sound travels through the nose.

Voiced: /n/ causes the voice box to vibrate.

**Continuous Sound:** You can draw out the /n/ sound until you run out of breath.

**Common Spellings:** nest, knight



**Throat Sound:** To make the /k/ sound, the mouth is open and the back of the tongue touches the back of the mouth near the throat.

Voiceless: The voice box does not vibrate when you say /k/.

Stop Sound: /k/ has a quick stop after it is produced.

Cousin: /g/

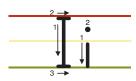


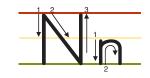

#### **VOWELS AND CONSONANTS**

Sounds /ĕ/ /d/ /f/



**Short Vowel:** To make the /ĕ/ sound, the mouth is slightly open and the tongue is relaxed in the middle of the mouth. The tip of the tongue rests on the back of the bottom teeth.

**Voiced:** /ĕ/ causes the voice box to vibrate.

Continuous Sound: You can draw out the /ĕ/ sound until you run out of breath.



Tongue Tapper: To make the /d/ sound, the mouth is partly open and the tongue taps the ridge behind the top teeth.

**Voiced:** /d/ causes the voice box to vibrate.

**Stop Sound:** /d/ has a quick stop after it is produced.

Cousin: /t/

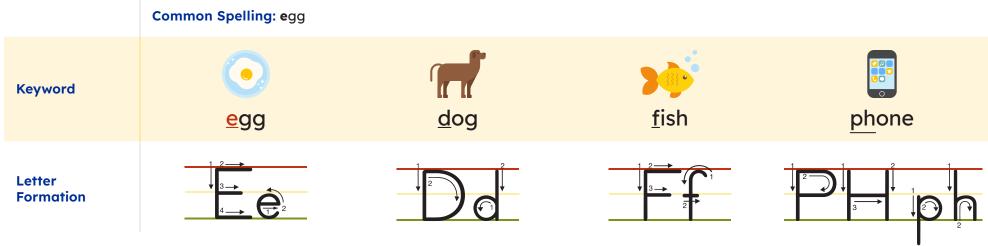
**Lip Biter:** To make the /f/ sound, the lower lip is curled in and the top teeth go over the bottom lip.

#### **VOWELS AND CONSONANTS**

**Short Vowel:** To make the /ŭ/ sound, the mouth is mostly open and the tongue is in the middle of the mouth and pulled back.

Voiced: /ŭ/ causes the voice box to vibrate.

**Continuous Sound: You** can draw out the /ŭ/ sound until you run out of breath.

Common Spelling: up



**Lip Popper:** To make the /b/ sound, the lips come together and then pop open with a burst of air.

Voiced: /b/ causes the voice box to vibrate.

**Stop Sound:** /b/ has a quick stop after it is produced.

Front Tongue Lifter: To make the /l/ sound, the mouth is open and the tip of the tongue lifts and touches behind the top teeth.

Voiced: /l/ causes the voice box to vibrate.

**Common Spellings:** lamp, fall



**Quick Lip Pusher:** To make the /i/ sound, the lips are pursed and a quick push of air comes out of the mouth; the tongue touches the roof of the mouth.

**Voiced:** /j/ causes the voice box to vibrate.

Stop Sound: /j/ has a quick stop after it is produced.

Cousin: /ch/

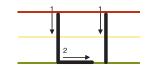


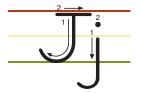

Tongue Presser: To make the /y/ sound, the tongue is lifted to the roof of the mouth and presses on the upper side teeth.

**Voiced:** /y/ causes the voice box to vibrate.

Continuous Sound: You can draw out the /y/ sound until you run out of breath.

**Common Spelling: yoyo** 



Tongue in the Cage: To make the /z/ sound, the lips are wide and slightly apart. The teeth stay together; the tongue is encaged behind them.

**Voiced:** /z/ causes the voice box to vibrate.

Continuous: You can draw out the /z/ sound until you run out of breath.

Cousin: /s/

Common Spellings: zebra, buzz



Lip Rounder: To make the /w/ sound, the lips purse in a circular shape and push out air.

**Voiced:** /w/ causes the voice box to vibrate.

Continuous Sound: You can draw out the /w/ sound until you run out of breath.

Cousin: /wh/

Common Spelling: wagon



**Lip Biter:** To make the /v/ sound, the lower lip is curled in and the teeth go over the bottom lip.

**Voiced:** /v/ causes the voice box to vibrate.

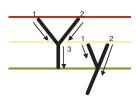

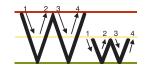

#### **MOVING CONSONANTS**

The letters 'q' and 'x' are outliers to the other 24 letters of the alphabet. These two letters are articulated with two sounds. The letter 'q' never is written without a 'u', so when teaching letter name and letter formation, they should be seen together and practiced together to reinforce this concept.

#### **LONG VOWELS**

Long vowels should be introduced after students are proficient in recognizing and reading short vowel patterns. Long vowels are produced with one sound, but represented by many graphemes and are not typically taught all at once. You can explicitly teach the long vowel phonemes when teaching each long vowel grapheme. This is not meant to be a sequence.

#### **R-CONTROLLED VOWELS**

R-controlled vowels are typically taught after the magic (or silent) 'e' pattern. The vowel pattern is spelled with an 'r' following a vowel: 'ar', 'or', 'er', 'ir', and 'ur'. These vowel patterns are typically introduced in the order below.

#### **DIPHTHONGS AND THE SCHWA**

Diphthongs are vowels produced by the tongue shifting during articulation. This is why there are two mouth images shown for each sound. A schwa is the empty vowel sound in an unstressed syllable. The most common sound for schwa is /uh/. Any vowel letter can spell the schwa sound. These patterns are not represented in any sequence.
